Prayer Group Ministry - Prayer group meetings take place Thursdays at 7:00pm. All are welcome.



In light of the passing of His Holiness Pope Francis, Campbell's Funeral Home has graciously provided a public condolence book for those who wish to express their sympathies and prayers.



SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER, YEAR C.

First Reading: Acts 5.12-16 Responsorial Psalm: 118 R1 "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his steadfast love endures forever." Second Reading: Revelation 1.9-11a, 12-13, 17-19 Gospel: John 20.19-31

THEME: What is Essential is Invisible

The 26th of April was the feast of our Lady of Good Counsel, the Patroness of the Catholic Women's League of Canada. This feast is a reminder of the Blessed Virgin Mary's role as a source of good counsel and guidance to us. Seeking Mary's wisdom and guidance helps us in making wise decisions in our daily living. This is seen in the great sacrifices the CWL of our parish make in various instances for the growth of our parish and homes. I invite other women in our parish to join the Catholic Women's League to keep their good work flourishing in our parish and world.

Our risen Lord knows how much peace eludes us; that is why His first gift to us after His resurrection was that of peace and the Holy Spirit – 'Peace be with you, as the Father has sent me, so I send you...Receive the Holy Spirit; if you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them...' (John 20:21-23). When we utilize this great mandate well, our hearts and minds are filled with the peace of Christ; the peace the world cannot give.

Thomas' statement, 'Unless I see, unless I touch, I will not believe' (John 20:25) is very reasonable and logical. It represents the rational approach, so much in vogue in our present world. Technological men and women cannot believe in anything that cannot be measured. Of course we must be guided by reason, but we must also listen to the voice of faith, which comes from the heart. There are aspects of life that cannot be rendered by purely rational means. Science is not everything. Like some of us, Thomas wanted to base his faith totally on fact. Fact can carry us only so far. Faith goes beyond what we can see and what we know. Faith is the belief that what we see is not all. If we remain in our thinking like Thomas, we will condemn ourselves to live in a purely material world. The visible world is only part of a greater world, which includes invisible realities from which it draws its chief significance. Faith takes us where our senses cannot go. Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth. We need to thank Thomas for taking care of our doubts and giving us such a mindful testimony on the reality of Jesus alive again in our hearts. As we have come to know Jesus very deeply within our hearts, may we have need to argue or seek for proof about faith; may our love and hearty relationship with God seen in our daily encounters with others be enough boost in our faith journey.

Rest in Peace, Holy Father

On Easter Monday the world received the news that Pope Francis died at 7:35am in Rome. The official Vatican statement given by Cardinal Kevin Farrell, Camerlengo of the Holy Roman Church read:

"Dearest brothers and sisters, with deep sorrow I must announce the death of our Holy Father Francis. At 7:35 this morning, the Bishop of Rome, Francis, returned to the house of the Father. His entire life was dedicated to the service of the Lord and of His Church. He taught us to live the values of the Gospel with fidelity, courage, and universal love, especially in favor of the poorest and most marginalized. With immense gratitude for his example as a true disciple of the Lord Jesus, we commend the soul of Pope Francis to the infinite merciful love of the One and Triune God."

His body was laid in the coffin on Monday evening. Pope Francis will lay in state for three days at St. Peter's Basilica to allow the faithful to pay their respects. The funeral will be celebrated on Saturday, April 26 at 10:00am Rome time in St. Peter's Square.

Archbishop Dunn met Pope Francis a number of times. He remembers the Holy Father as a humble man with a good sense of humour and a great love of the Church and its people. Archbishop Dunn shared these words:

I appreciated his wonderful view of the Church. It was indeed quite refreshing: he called people to go out to the margins and to see the church as a field hospital. He called for unity within the Church and for a constant reform of the Curia. He called us to a culture of encounter of Jesus Christ with a focus of accompaniment. He reformed the way the Church responded to sexual abuse and his trip to Canada reinforced reconciliation with indigenous peoples. His focus on synodality was a call to be church in a new way. He was true to his Jesuit formation as he constantly called us to have spiritual conversations to discern the presence of God in our everyday lives.

Pope Francis was recently discharged from the hospital after dealing with pneumonia and other health concerns with many praying that he was on the mend. He took part in various Holy Week and Easter liturgies as he was able. He offered the Urbi et Orbi blessing to "the City (Rome) and the World" on Easter Sunday and spent some time greeting the people from the popemobile. His first time doing so since before his hospitalization.

Let us hold Pope Francis in our prayers as well as his family and all who knew him. A date for a local Memorial Mass for Pope Francis will be announced in the coming days. The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops has also released a prayer card for the repose of the soul of Pope Francis.
